Where to Go Hiking Nearby the Town?

Ruins of St. Vitus Chapel

On St. Vitus Hill near Lukov once stood a Baroque chapel of the Augustinian hermits. It was built in 1677 by the estate owner, Rudolf Jindřich of Schaumburg.

On your way to St. Vitus, you can also visit local **caves** – just take a look at the map and you'll find them.



Jewish Cemetery

The cemetery has been located on the outskirts of the town since 1908. At that time, the town had a strong Jewish community (about 100 people) and a synagogue, which has not survived.



Historic Train Ride

The Jemnice Railway offers rides for both parents and children. From the observation car, you can enjoy unique views of the surrounding countryside.

A Bit of History and a Touch of the Present

Moravské Budějovice was first mentioned in 1231 in a document issued by Pope Gregory IX.

The town developed along the Haberská trail, an important trade route from Prague to Austria.

In 1498, King Vladislaus II Jagiellon granted the town a coat of arms and a seal, which was unusual for a serf town. He also confirmed its judicial, market, and brewing rights, as well as the right of mile.

Over time, the town came under the ownership of several noble families, including the Bítovský of Lichtenburg and the Irish-origin Wallis family.

The Rokyta River flows through the town, which today has more than 7,000 inhabitants. Budějovice lies at an altitude of 466 m above sea level.

Thanks to its location almost halfway between Jihlava and Znojmo, on the former imperial road connecting Vienna with Prague, Moravské Budějovice is close to everywhere.

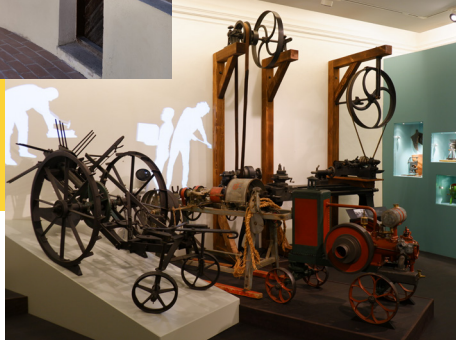




The Town Mansion

The mansion was built in the second half of the 17th century by converting four burgher houses and the town hall. Today, it houses a museum with two permanent exhibitions. The Story of the Town and Mansion presents the history and interiors of the mansion from the turn of the 19th and 20th centuries. Crafts and Trades of Southwest Moravia introduces both common and less common trades of the region. The crafts exhibition also includes the former butcher shops.

St. Giles Church

This three-aisled church, dedicated to St. Giles, was first mentioned in 1235. Between 1712 and 1722, the parish priest had it rebuilt in the Baroque style, including the present steeple.

The main altar is decorated with a painting by Viennese artist Ignaz Dullinger. Also worth noting are the unusual Stations of the Cross by Jan Florian and the sculptures by Jaroslav Šlezinger.



Rectory

The Baroque gable of the rectory bears the date 1779, marking its Baroque reconstruction. A memorial plaque on the building commemorates the writer Václav Kosmák, who worked in the town. The lower part of the rectory is incorporated into the town walls, and one of the original town gates can be found directly beneath it.



Steeple

After climbing 128 steps, you will reach the viewing gallery at a height of 26 m. The spire of the steeple rises up to 50 m.



Pararula Fold

This geological formation was created between 750 and 530 million years ago, when the area was covered by a shallow sea or coastline. The land was rocky and without vegetation, and frequent earthquakes shook the earth.



St. Michael's Chapel

(Romanesque charnel house)
Built in the 13th century by settlers from the Danube region, next to the church of that time. The lower floor served as an ossuary for the now-vanished cemetery around the church.



St. Anne's Chapel

Originally a Gothic church belonging to the town hospital, it is estimated to have been built at the beginning of the 15th century.
